

## **Backyard Species Discovery – Weekly Challenge**

# Week 6

#### Build a native bee hotel

The Backyard Species Discovery project is a virtual expedition to continue adding to our knowledge of Australian biodiversity while field work is still difficult due to COVID-19 travel restrictions.

In addition to adding observations to iNaturalist, the Backyard Species Discovery project encourages Australians to learn about the importance of biodiversity and explore ways to improve and protect it.

## Here is your challenge:

To prepare for increased native bee activity in spring our Week 6 Challenge is to Build a Native Bee Hotel. Many solitary and semi-social native bees nest in cavities above the ground, however much of their habitat is being lost so we can help provide alternative homes for them. Send us a photo or video of you making your bee hotel.

### Tips:

- It doesn't have to be a big hotel it can be as simple as drilling
  holes in a block of untreated, weather- resistant wood, or placing
  lengths of bamboo in an old food tin as shown in the photo. Other
  suitable materials include the dried stems of plants such as
  Lantana, ferns, roses, blackberries, Hydrangea, grapevines and
  fennel, which could alternatively be secured in a bundle with string
  or tape.
- If drilling holes in wood, diameters between 3-12mm are best, with most bees preferring diameters around 7mm. Holes should be at least 50mm long but aim for 100-200mm in length.
- Securely fix the block of wood or bundle of stems to a solid surface in a sheltered position.

- While you won't be able to add your hotel to our Backyard Species Discovery Project on iNaturalist, it should attract some wild visitors that you can add some time in the future!
